



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT AND THE CEO

“AFTER A TREMENDOUS FINA WORLD SERIES WHERE BETWEEN MARCH AND JUNE TEAM CANADA WON 36 MEDALS, (10 GOLD, 13 SILVER, 13 BRONZE) AND WON THE OVERALL “SUPER FINAL” CHAMPIONSHIP, CANADA HAD SOLIDLY POSITIONED ITSELF AS A COUNTRY ON THE MOVE”

As we look back at the year ending March 31, 2019, we cannot help but start with what has happened since. This year, our Senior National Team has had one focus and one goal which carried them through the 2018/19 season – to qualify for the 2020 Olympic Games. After a tremendous FINA World Series where between March and June Team Canada won 36 medals, (10 gold, 13 silver, 13 bronze) and won the overall “Super Final” championship, Canada had solidly positioned itself as a country on the move. At the World Aquatic Championship that followed, the team had season's best performances and closed the score gap on the countries ahead. Finally, at the 2019 Pan American Games, in Lima, Peru, at the continental qualification event for the 2020 Olympic Games, Team Canada did not disappoint. Our athletes had established themselves as the ones to beat. After four solid performances in Lima, and again season best scores, Canada captured gold in duet and team and are heading to Tokyo 2020. Mission accomplished!

Key Accomplishments

Around the work done to support and develop our senior national team, and the High Performance program in general, 2018-2019 continued to be a year of change and development for Artistic Swimming in Canada. As we wrapped up year three of our eight-year Strategic Plan we want to highlight some of the key accomplishments;

- Significant progress in Policy development and policy alignment with Members
- Focus on coaching standardization, education and professionalization – through registration and certification requirements, new AquaGO! Instructor certification program, revision of Competition Introduction training commenced.
- New on-line registration and competition registration software
- Re-name and Re-brand for Canada Artistic Swimming and half of CAS Member PTSOs
- New AquaGO! entry level program launched
- Standard calendar for athlete development at 13-15 and Junior national team levels
- Successfully applied for a change from Canada Winter to Canada Summer Games – effective 2025
- Hosted some very successful international events – FINA World Series #7 (Surrey in 2018, Quebec City in 2019) and most recently the 2019 UANA Pan Am Artistic Swimming Championships (Windsor)
- Provided assistance to FINA and UANA through our international representatives to effect change in areas needing to progress

Implementation of Safe Sport Program

Safe sport has become a major focus in Canada and Canada Artistic Swimming has re-affirmed its commitment to providing a safe and healthy environment for our athletes, coaches, officials, staff and volunteers. Over the past three years we have been rolling out mandatory Respect in Sport Activity Leader training at various levels and recently introduced mandatory screening to our list of safe sport practices. Along with the implementation of a National Conduct Policy and the appointment of Lise McLean, our sport's third-party Safe Sport Officer, we have put the necessary processes and training in place to make our sport a warm and welcoming place to participate.

It is a source of great pride for the CAS Board of Directors to note the progress that has already been made towards the accomplishments in our ambitious strategic plan. Realistically, we have a way to go to reach the Olympic podium by 2024, but the organization is on track and looking forward to another step up the ladder as our duet and team compete in Tokyo next summer!

- Canada competed in 4 FINA World Series Events in Tech Team, Free Team, Highlight, 2 Tech Duets, 1 Free Duet, 2 Tech Solos, 2 Free Solos) and 1 additional World Series Event in Duet Tech, Duet Free and Solo Tech and Free

By the numbers

- 10 athletes were selected from 9 different clubs and 4 different provinces

Team Routine Selection

- Judges at the 2019 Qualifier were asked to recommend three junior free routines as options for the 13-15 team routine
- Choreographer **Denise Sauve** and Head Coach **Elena Podolsky** were given the three judge options and were asked to select a routine. The Dollard Junior Free Routine was selected
- During the selection camp, the athletes learned each lap of the team routine in teams of 8, and swam the routine for the judges in teams of 8, which formed part of the team selection process

Preparation Camp #1, July 26-August 20th, Waterloo Region

- Three pools were used for training: Elmira, Brantford, Waterloo
- Jennifer Bell**, Camp Athletic Therapist, on deck during training
- Three athletes trained the 13-15 duet routine from Dollard (including the two Dollard athletes that swam the duet during the season)
- All athletes trained the team routine

Preparation Camp #2, August 21-25, 2019. Samorin Slovakia

- Joint camp with the National 13-15 Team from Slovakia at the event competition venue
- Camp objectives were to adjust to travel and the time change and to develop a familiarity with the outdoor competition venue for the event

2019 FINA YOUTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

- Canada placed 11th in the Team Preliminary and 12th in the Duet preliminary events
- Canada's highest placed athlete on figures day was 46th
- Following a solid figure performance by all athletes, Canada qualified for the Team Final in 10th place and the Duet Final in 11th place.
- Canada maintained its 11th place ranking in the Duet Final. All three athletes that trained the duet competed
- Canada dropped to 12th place in the team final, finishing 11th in the routine score, but 12th when combined with the figures results
- Canada competed in the Mixed Duet, finishing with a career best routine score of 69.5668

Program Objectives

- Replace the one-day "selection event" after a major event with a selection camp
- Involve athletes' coaches in the process
- Evaluate athlete progress from start to end of a camp
- Evaluate athlete progress from start to end of a competitive season
- Evaluate and track athlete progress over many seasons
- Align athlete evaluation with the FINA Judge Manual and the CAS Gold Medal Profile
- Develop a network of unbiased talent I.D scouts (including officials)

Talent ID Process for the 2019 Season

- Pre-Event**
 - Coach submits depth chart (ranking) with their "Yes-No" recommendations
 - Summary of recommended athletes & their events provide to Talent I.D. scout
- Post-Event**
 - Coach submits depth chart with Yes-No recommendations (adjusts as needed after the event)
 - Ind. athlete evaluations for Recommended Athletes submitted by coaches
 - Talent ID Scout Report
- Review of all the information collected**
 - Recommended athlete lists (Talent I.D. Scout, coaches)
 - Past National Team results, including athlete evaluations
 - Event results (over two seasons)
 - PTSO input
- Development of Invite Lists for Camps (13-15, Junior)**

STANDARDIZED 13-15 AND JUNIOR NATIONAL TEAM PROGRAMS

Rational

- Standard & predictable calendar to make planning easier for parents, provinces, clubs and coaches to plan
- Standard program to allow for consistent periodization of athlete training and preparation
- Improved alignment and integration of Provincial Programs=shared responsibility for the development of high-performance Athlete and coaches
- Limited resources at CAS (human and financial) so we need to narrow the focus

National – Provincial Alignment

- National team selections take place BEFORE provincial programs begin
- Provincial programs/teams are an integral part of the HP athlete pathway
- Provincial Programs form and send teams to events – athletes get experience in a short-term competition environment that will help prepare them for national programs, also a ST competition environment

Typical Program Calendar

- 13-15 and Junior will alternate summers aligned with the FINA WC
- Program is 100% athlete fee funded except for coaching salaries
- Talent I.D to end of summer – invites to first evaluations camp in early fall
- December Selection Camp (7-8 days)
 - Standardized assessments and standards for each age (Sr, Jr, 13-15)
- January-February Regional Camps (4 days each)
 - Choreography focus
- 2-3 weeks post Nationals (date of camp will depend on the date of Nationals)
- Athletes return to provincial teams /club teams to continue training/preparing
- 4-6 week prep camp (s) prior to Worlds (length of camp will depend on the date of the WCs, end of the school year and available resources)
- World Championships

CANADA GAMES UPDATE

- Following a formal application process lead by the Canada Games Council, Artistic Swimming was successful with its application for being moved from the Winter Games to the Summer Games
- Artistic Swimming's next Canada Games will be in the summer of 2025

2019-2020 SEASON KEY ACTIVITIES

- Following the 2019 season of Talent ID, the decision was made not to hold a Fall Evaluation Camp in September 2019 because there were no athletes identified (that had scored in the mid to high 8s) ready to challenge the twelve athletes in the 2019 Full-time Training Group
- The National Senior Program will centralize in Montreal at INS-Q starting in October 2019 to train and prepare for the 2020 Olympic Games and the 2020 FINA World Series season
- Following the September FTTG in-take camp, the team will participate in its first-ever “boot-camp” in Stoneham Quebec. Camp will be an intensive out of pool training camp, focusing on the continued development of fitness and athletic abilities, as well as the development of the team's culture
- The National Team Outreach Program will include three club visits in the fall of 2019, as well as a Water Show Tour at the beginning of June 2020
- The National Team Inreach Program, called “Project Paris” whose development is in progress, will be launched
 - Based on a set of established and communicated criteria and minimum standards, coaches can nominate their athletes to train in Montreal alongside the FTTG (self-funded)
 - Project Paris will provide athletes an opportunity to see and experience first-hand the full-time training environment in Montreal with an objective of understanding what is required for an athlete to be successful in that environment
 - Project Paris will develop an athlete's understanding of what is required to be a high performance athlete
 - It will provide the national coaching staff an opportunity to assess athletes and their potential for future national teams
- Coach selection for the 2019 National Junior Program will begin at the Junior Evaluation Camp, December 17-22, In Montreal, at INS-Q
